

**Analysis of use and desired impact for Pupil Premium Funding**

**1. Summary Information**

**2. Context and Purpose**

Publicly-funded schools in England get extra funding from the government to help them improve the attainment of their disadvantaged pupils. Evidence shows that children from disadvantaged backgrounds:

- generally, face extra challenges in reaching their potential at school
- often do not perform as well as their peers

The pupil premium grant is designed to allow schools to help disadvantaged pupils by improving their progress and the exam results they achieve.

### **Eligibility and funding**

Schools get pupil premium funding based on the number of pupils they have in January each year from the following groups.

### **Free school meals**

Schools get £1,320 for every primary age pupil, or £935 for every secondary age pupil.

### **Looked-after and previously looked-after children**

Schools get £2,300 for every pupil who has left local authority care through adoption, a special guardianship order or child arrangements order. From April 2020, the new rate will be £2,345 per eligible pupil.

## **3. Overview 2019 – 2020**

- 48% of pupils were entitled to Pupil Premium Funding. Total Pupil Premium funding for the Albany was £29,433.59
- The percentage of pupils who were entitled to PPG funding in each year group were as follows;
  - Year 11 - 38%
  - Year 10 - 23%
  - Year 9 – 27%
  - Year 8 - 12%

## **4. PPG Spending**

Evidence suggests that pupil premium spending is most effective when schools use a tiered approach, targeting spending across the following 3 areas below but focusing on teaching quality - investing in learning and development for teachers.

### **Teaching**

Schools arrange training and professional development for all their staff to improve the impact of teaching and learning for pupils.

### **Academic support**

Schools should decide on the main issues stopping their pupils from succeeding at school and use the pupil premium to buy extra help.

### **Wider approaches**

This may include non-academic use of the pupil premium such as:

- school breakfast clubs
- music lessons for disadvantaged pupils
- help with the cost of educational trips or visits
- speech and language therapy

Schools may find using the pupil premium in this way helps to:

- increase pupils' confidence and resilience
- encourage pupils to be more aspirational
- benefit non-eligible pupils

### **Albany PPG Spending**

- Push Forward – Specialist group and 1 to 1 provision looking at life skills, well-being and practical applications for Work Related Learning
- 50% Contributions to MMA sessions
- 50% Contributions to Rugby Club sessions
- 50% Contributions to Sunset Barn Care Farm sessions
- 25% Contributions towards 1 to 1 staff home tuition
- 50% Contributions to TLC learning online tutoring
- 50% Contributions to Winchmore tutors 1 to 1 home tutoring
- 50% Contribution to Challenge Learning (inc, Thorpe Woodlands, Click n climb, gymnastics and horse riding)
